- d) Develop students' critical thinking skills by articulating the leading explanations why International organizations (IOs) exist, controversies surrounding those organizations in the context of international relations theory, why they are thought to help solve global problems, and the major challenges IOs face in meeting their objectives

3. Description of Subject:

This course will provide an overview of both the theory and functioning of international organizations in promoting international cooperation. Traditional international relations theories characterize the international system as revolutionary and focus on interactions between nations. Nowadays, international organizations have become more prominent players in the international system. Debate continues in academic and policy communities over why international organizations exist, whether they matter in global politics, and when they can help alleviate global problems. The goal of this course is that students develop a theoretical as well as practical understanding of international organizations (IOs) and the global problems they attempt to address.
